#### PRESENTATIONS & PROCLAMATIONS

# Retirement Plaque Presentation—Mike Kiggins, Animal Control Supervisor

Mayor Kaumo stated that the Animal Control Supervisor, Mike Kiggins, is retiring after 3 months short of 30 years, and his job is a very tough one. Mr. Kiggins spoke, stating that it has been a pleasure working for the City of Rock Springs, with every type of animal coming into town. It has been a real honor and a privilege to serve the City of Rock Springs. Mayor Kaumo added that he has done an outstanding job, and Chief Pacheco has stated that there has not been an animal that he could not catch. He added that we appreciate everything that he has done for the City. His will be big shoes to fill.

## Presentation of the New Rock Springs Police Department Patch—Sergeant Mathew Register

Sergeant Mat Register, Rock Springs Police Department, presented the new Police Department patch along with Kelly Battisti, Career Services Specialist. Sergeant Register and Ms. Battisti presented a draft version of the patch at the last Chief's Call, and at that point they realized that the RSPD patch is very historical and meaningful to the officers and staff at the Police Department. The history of the patch was discussed. The symbolism of each item was discussed, and the center, focal point of the patch was an old City seal that was discovered at the Rock Springs Historical Museum. Marketing was considered to aid with the epidemic in hiring and retention, and the patch is an important part of that. The officers and staff of the Police Department voted on a draft patch, all of which were focused on the natural resource industry, along with other details including color, wording, and design placement. The design of the patch was a team effort throughout the whole Police Department. Ms. Battisti added that Sergeant Register spoke about filling numbers, which includes now and in the future, and marketing early is important. Creating symbolism and legacy is important for recruitment and retention.

## Urban Renewal Agency—2019 Annual Report

Chad Banks, Urban Renewal Agency Manager, stated that private investment was at \$159,186, and 29.5 net full time jobs were created downtown. Volunteers donated 2,025.25 hours in 2019, which volunteers are critical to the operation of the Urban Renewal Agency. There were 90 events at the Bunning Hall, with attendance nearing 11,000, which is a 25% increase over 2018; and 110 events at the Broadway Theater, with attendance topping 11,000, which is a 30% increase over 2018. There are 122 members of the Friends of the Broadway Program. 11 new businesses opened in 2019 downtown. The Wyoming Business Council approved the First Security Bank Building Project Phase I, which included efforts on the part of many departments within the City to make it successful. Small Business Saturday was a huge success in 2019, and a quarterly merchant meeting was instituted to get all merchants together to present topics of interest and give each owner a chance to discuss ideas. The first ever Taco Fest was held, and over 2,200 tacos were served, which raised \$4,000. The first ever Rock Springs Arts Week was held in conjunction with the Community Fine Arts Center in 2019. A new initiative called \$20 on the 20<sup>th</sup> encouraged citizens to spend \$20 downtown on the 20<sup>th</sup> of each month. The first ever dining deck at Bitter Creek Brewing was approved and built in 2019. Dominion Energy donated time renovating the historic caboose on South Main Street. The electronic charging station was completed, thanks to Councilor Halter and Paul Kauchich, Director of Engineering/Operations & Public Services. A total of 6 grants were received in 2019. Rock Springs was named one of the 15 best small towns to visit by Smithsonian Magazine. The 2019 Main Street Awards were swept in Wyoming, with 3 awards handed to Rock Springs. Mayor Kaumo added that he is excited about the First Security Bank Building project and bringing additional life to our downtown. Seeing the positive outcome at the SLIB Board meeting for this project is encouraging.

### Sweetwater Travel & Tourism Office—2019 Annual Report

Jenissa Meredith, Executive Director of the Sweetwater Travel & Tourism Office, presented their 2019 Annual Report. Travel & Tourism is the local Lodging Tax Board to administer the 4% lodging tax, which was increased to the maximum of 4% in 2018. The lodging tax must be spent

on marketing and promotional items. Just over \$1,000,000 was collected in 2018-2019. Any event that is hosted by a local entity that generates lodging dollars can be funded by grants with this collected tax. Event recruitment is another focus. Ms. Meredith listed boards she is serving on. 2019 was designated by the Governor as the year of the woman. Wyoming women were given the right to vote 50 years before any other women in the country. The Proud Wyoming Woman Retreat in 2019 included fly fishing, dutch oven cooking, and other area-specific hobbies to promote Wyoming. A video was shown about the Proud Wyoming Woman event. The 2019 event promoted women's suffrage. In 2019, 27,000 travel guide requests were fulfilled. An enewsletter is distributed monthly, discussing events going on in the area, and 60,000 receive it every month. A tourism video was shown which is live on the Travel & Tourism website. Annually, the effectiveness of advertising is measured. Conversion studies are conducted to see how many who requested the travel guide actually traveled to Wyoming. The number of trips influenced by Travel & Tourism marketing materials was 3,940. In 2019, \$5.4 million in spending was generated by Travel & Tourism marketing materials. Upcoming projects for 2020 included creating a Flaming Gorge tour, hoped to be up and running by summer of 2020 to include a motor coach traveling the Gorge twice a week. Another project is Destination Next, which is a strategic plan for the Travel & Tourism office. A local social campaign is being started, called #lifeissweetwater. Customer service training will be offered in 2020 and targeted toward first-line tourism ambassadors in our County. Mayor Kaumo stated that front-line employees are important when it comes to attracting tourists, everyone here should want to promote Rock Springs and the area. Wayfinding signs are a focus of the City to help tourists get to where they need and want to go.

### **PETITIONS**

David Degoyette stated that he is from the Seattle area, and moved to Sweetwater County about a year ago. An issue that he sees is at the Recreation Center. Concerns regarding children in the facility were discussed. Asking for help at the front desk has become frustrating. Mr. Degoyette suggested a reporting process for complaints, where issues are documented and have oversight. The police department has also been called and the fact that nothing was done when help was requested is disheartening. Mayor Kaumo stated that the Director of Parks and Recreation was involved after he met with him previously, and the Police Department was also involved, to which Mr. Degoyette stated that this is a new issue. Mr. Degoyette stated that he was made to feel like he was the problem by reporting this new issue. He was told that this is part of our culture, which constitutes dismissal of the whole problem. Councilor Zotti asked at the Rec Center and Civic Center whether there are official processes for complaints. Mayor Kaumo stated that the culture at the Recreation Center is a main focus already. Mayor Kaumo asked Chief Pacheco about the report relating to the most recent incident, to which Chief Pacheco stated that it is still under review. Mayor Kaumo stated that the City does not expect anyone to go through this problem with no solution, and that he will discuss this issue with department heads and staff. Councilor Shalata asked about attendance times, as he attends regularly as well. He sees some of the issues such as unsupervised children, but otherwise there is a fine group of employees at the Recreation Center o take care of patrons. Mr. Degoyette added that he does not like the Civic Center because of the steepness of the stairs. Councilor Zotti asked about contact information and whether we could contact him once progress is made. Mayor Kaumo confirmed that we would contact him when the issue is researched.

## Joint Powers Fiber Optics Telecommunication Board Meeting Minutes of December 17, 2019

Councilor West stated that the Board of County Commissioners met today, and the amount has been reduced to \$29 million for the City of Rock Springs. Mayor Kaumo confirmed that a cut of over \$13,410,000 has been made, and we either accept it or don't participate. A couple things left on the table are that we don't know how sponsored projects will be listed on the ballot, whether they will be standalone, and whether the City should hold firm at the \$42 million. Commissioners voted on \$25 million for the County, to include Memorial Hospital of Sweetwater County and the Sweetwater Events Complex projects. Mayor Kaumo added that the Board of County Commissioners have indicated that they respect the City because it made the first cuts in the process. Councilor West added that the next step is for the municipalities to decide whether they are going to accept the proposed distribution amounts, as it still takes 2/3 of the municipalities to pass the master resolution before it can be placed on the ballot. After that, they all need to have discussion regarding how each project should be placed on the ballot. Councilor Zotti stated that the frustration is that the City of Rock Springs made its cuts and other entities came back with more than should have been requested. Mayor Kaumo asked whether the Governing Body wants to get together to discuss this again before the next Board of County Commissioners meeting.

Moved by Councilor Zotti, seconded by Councilor West to approve the Council Committee and Board Reports and place them on file. Motion carried unanimously.
